Congressional Mail Comes to a Halt

On Monday, the discovery of the poison ricin in the mailroom of a Senate office resulted in the suspension of all mail deliveries to the House and Senate office buildings in Washington, D.C. Mail service to my district offices in Hays and Hutchinson has not been interrupted. The ongoing investigation is preventing further mail deliveries to congressional offices in Washington, D.C, and all mail is currently being screened and held in an offsite location. At this time, it is unclear whether this mail will ultimately be delivered or destroyed.

As a result of this incident, I am encouraging Kansans to contact me via email, phone or fax, or through my district offices in Hutchinson and Hays. The contact information for all of my offices is listed below.

Appearing on Kansas Public Television

On Monday evening, I appeared live on Kansas public television stations to discuss the 2004 congressional session and to answer questions from viewers. During the hour-long broadcast, viewers from across the state called in with questions ranging from the national deficit and the budget, to the war in Iraq and the rising costs of health care. Kansans are very concerned about these issues, and I appreciate that folks took time out of their busy schedules to call in with questions.

Hearing on Veterans' Funding

On Wednesday, the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs held a hearing to review the President's proposed budget for the Department of Veterans' Affairs (VA) for the next year. The Secretary for Veterans' Affairs, Anthony Principi, testified before the committee about the future funding for the VA's three major functions, including the VA Health Care Administration, the VA Benefits Administration and the National Cemetery Association. The secretary also discussed proposals for improving veterans' education, pensions, housing and burial. As the committee works through next year's VA budget, I will continue to ensure that we work to meet the needs of our veterans. After the hearing, I had the chance to visit with Secretary Principi to discuss issues important to Kansans and our veterans.

Final Stretch of the "Big First" Listening Tour

With 13 stops left on this year's tour, my annual "Big First" Listening Tour is nearly completed. If you haven't had a chance to attend one of the town hall meetings, I hope you can make it out to one of the final stops. It has been a pleasure meeting with folks during the past 56 tour stops, and I look forward to meeting with you when I am in your area.

Today, I will be in Marienthal and Scott City, and I will be in Grandview Plaza on Friday. My remaining town hall meetings will be in Grainfield, Selden, Atwood, Oberlin, Norton, Meade, Liberal, Hugoton, Dodge City and Jetmore.

Members of the Kansas School Board Associations were in the office this week to share their concerns about federal education legislation. Cindy Kelly of Topeka, Rodney Roush of Stafford, Pam Gruber of Hope, Robert Loftlin of Weskan, Darlene Jones of Plainville, and Glennys Doane of Downs were in to discuss the No Child Left Behind Act and the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.
