Plot to Bomb U.S.-Bound Jets is Foiled, the War on Terror Continues

A plot to simultaneously blow up as many as 10 U.S.-bound passenger jets with liquid explosives hidden in carry-on luggage was foiled on Thursday. The British government has arrested numerous suspects. According to Homeland Security Secretary Michael Chertoff, the plot "was sophisticated, it had a lot of members and it was international in scope." He said the suspects planned to smuggle bombs and detonators disguised as beverages, electronic devices and other everyday objects onto planes.

This is another reminder that the world is not a very safe place. There are still people out there who are interested in causing death to Americans. This is not a time to panic, but rather it is a time to make sure we are taking all the

necessary steps to protect the American people. I commend British and U.S. officials for thwarting the terrorists' planned attack.

Discussing Agriculture Disaster Assistance with NFU President

Tom and I discussed the severity of the drought in Kansas and throughout the western plains.
